Extra-Curricular and Enrichment Activities in the **Preparatory Department**

We provide numerous enrichment opportunities for pupils to thrive beyond the curriculum. Whether creative, musical or sporting, these opportunities enable our pupils to find their talents, encourage ambition and extend existing abilities.

Developing Personal and Social Qualities

In the Preparatory Department we provide a number of exciting enrichment opportunities both inside and outside the classroom. For our Infants, they have weekly Forest school/Outdoor Education sessions.

Girls in the Juniors take part in our Enrichment programme. This allows girls to develop a wide range of new skills and takes place during the school day on a Tuesday for Lower Juniors and a Wednesday for Upper Juniors. Examples of activities include cookery, animation, STEM, coding, outdoor education and textile design. Pupils will spend five weeks completing a particular activity before the carousel will rotate.

Teaching life-skills and encouraging character building have always been important objectives within education, but often these skills can be forgotten. Now more than ever, developing a thriving Enrichment programme is an essential part of promoting academic attainment and employability in the future; teaching young people the skills they need to make good choices well beyond the classroom.

Action & Adventure

Students are encouraged to challenge themselves both physically and emotionally through a range of outdoor pursuits and residential adventures.

Manchester High students have been utilising the opportunities afforded by the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme to develop the skills and attitudes that help them to become more rounded, confident adults.

Outdoor Pursuits

Spending time in the natural environment brings huge benefits and each cohort will have several opportunities for residential trips throughout their MHSG life. For children in Key Stage 3, this includes trips to the Lake District whilst older students have the chance to participate in a Lowland Leader's qualification which enables girls to lead groups on day walks in countryside and woodland areas.

Duke of Edinburgh Award

We are delighted to be able to offer the Bronze, Silver and Gold Duke of Edinburgh Awards. For more than ten years, Manchester High students have been utilising the opportunities afforded by the scheme to develop the skills and attitudes that help them to become more rounded, confident adults. Through extra-curricular activities, students learn to improve their communication, commitment, leadership and teamwork skills; they understand the importance of making a difference within their community, becoming fitter and healthier whilst creating lasting memories.

Enterprise & Ingenuity

Students with an enterprising mindset will be in good company at Manchester High. We like our students to be bold, imaginative, innovative and resourceful. With this in mind, there are many scholarly clubs on offer for enquiring minds from Young Enterprise to literacy and languages-based groups.

Young Enterprise

The Young Enterprise programme gives pupils the life skills, knowledge and confidence they need to succeed in the changing world of work.

Students from Junior Sixth set up and run a company over the course of one academic year. They elect a Board of Directors from their peers, raise share capital and market a product or service of their choice. At the end of the year, they present a report and accounts to their shareholders and compete in a regional Young Enterprise competition. Developing a business is an incredibly tough endeavour and as well as technical skills, students learn the importance of resilience and accountability.

STEM

(Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths)

Our extra-curricular STEM provision enhances our regular programme of learning and is designed to be an enjoyable and powerful way of engaging students with STEM subjects.

STEM subjects are explored in imaginative and inventive ways through a series of clubs and programmes that utilise the expertise of staff, partner companies and competitions. Students will develop practical, teamwork and leadership skills and gain an insight into STEM-related careers.

Science

The Science Department leads a variety of weekly clubs from the hands-on STEM Club in Year 7 to Dissection Club and DVD (Doctors, Vets, Dentists) for Sixth Formers. These run alongside competitions: from the internal Biological Photography Competition to external competitions run by the Royal Society of Biology. There are also plenty of enriching trips including a Sixth Form Astrophysics Study Day at Jodrell express and develop their enjoyment of Mathematics. Bank, a biennial visit to Geneva to the Large Hadron Collider at CERN and visits to Science Live.

Technology -Computer Coding and Problem Solving

There are opportunities to get involved in courses and competitions throughout the year from Apps for Good, which is open to all KS3 students and uses technology to solve problems, to cyber security clubs. Our Cyber First Club in Year 8 sees students taking part in a national competition to crack codes whilst Year 10 and II Computer Studies students have the opportunity to simulate the role of an agent for the virtual Cyber Protection Agency. Key students are also selected to take part in the University of Oxford 'Bebras' Computation Thinking Competition that requires logical thinking to solve fun and engaging tasks.

Engineering

For several years, we have been involved in the Industrial Cadets Gold Project which is run by the Engineering Development Trust (EDT). A group of students are chosen to work alongside industry professionals, gaining insight and exposure to STEM and the world of work, which opens their eyes to exciting careers and opportunities. Connecting young people with industry and role models helps them 'see themselves' in STEM, to make informed choices about their future whilst developing the skills needed to enter industry with confidence.

Maths

Our Mathletes clubs run throughout the Senior School and are a great opportunity for students to access Maths in a fun and engaging way. The clubs also prepare pupils for the UKMT Maths Challenges, as well as the national Team Maths Challenge competition. Mathletes combines mathematical, communication and teamwork skills and offers students the chance to In addition, an Enrichment Club helps support our Year 11 students and looks at some of the trickier types of Maths problems you can encounter at GCSE level by examining past problems and finding the best approaches to solve them.

The Arts

Manchester has a thriving arts and culture scene and is home to art galleries, theatres and museums that attract international performances and productions. With so much creativity on our doorstep, our pupils are given every opportunity to explore the performing, visual and creative arts both in school and in the wider community.

Performing Arts

Drama

Engaging with performing arts allows our pupils to explore their emotions, expand their imagination and helps them develop their own, unique voice. The Drama Department provides girls with excellent opportunities in acting, directing and technical skills through performance and theatre visits.

A range of performing opportunities take place throughout the year including a Cabaret evening, lower school drama showcase, Drama Club productions, a Year 8 Drama interform competition, Sixth Form Play-in-a-Week and Senior and Junior Performing Arts evenings. Our annual school production combines the talents of our Drama, Dance and Music Departments and is a platform for students to showcase their creativity, whether it is behind the scenes or on-stage. It is a fantastic opportunity for students to forge new friendships across school and develop teamwork, cooperation and communication skills whilst inevitably raising self-confidence and esteem. Past productions have included *Sweeney Todd, Billy Elliot, Hairspray, Sister Act* and *Little Shop of Horrors.*

In addition to curricular and extra-curricular Drama, we offer LAMDA Speech and Drama lessons for individuals, duos and groups which are extremely popular with girls from Year 2 through to Year 13.

Dance

With styles ranging from contemporary, jazz, musical theatre, hip-hop, street dance, ballet and Bollywood, there are plenty of opportunities for our students to dance! Every year group has its own Dance club in our beautiful mirrored dance studio and the chance to audition for our Junior and Senior Dance companies each autumn.

Dance performances include the annual musical production, internal competitions and a dance show in the spring term which celebrates our talented community. For those students on a dance scholarship, there is also the opportunity to lead their own Dance club.

Music

A purpose-built music wing provides our Music Department with perfect acoustics and ample space to teach over 20 different instruments. Each week, more than 300 individual instrumental and singing lessons take place in the Department, and a large number of students also participate in our extra-curricular music provision with opportunities for students of all ages and abilities.

A full events calendar gives students the chance to perform; from the monthly Twilight Concerts, Christmas Concert and Summer Soirée to our Celebration & Awards Evening at the Bridgewater Hall and the annual Carol Service at St. Ann's Church, Manchester. Numerous competitions run alongside these events including the annual Warburton Competition which has run every year since 1935 and is named after former teacher, musician and composer, Dr Annie Warburton.
